Executive summary	NEL NHS has allocated £2.271m funding over 3 years (£757k per year) to the Redbridge Placed Based Partnership (RPbP) to address Health Inequalities, with the programme running from August / September 2023 to July / August 2026. Project start time will be dependent on procurement / commissioning arrangements.
	To ensure a fair process the RPbP informed all partner organisations about the opportunity to bid for the funding with a deadline being set for 30 <sup>th</sup> June 2023. This invite was extended to Redbridge CVS member organisations.
	In total 32 separate bids were submitted with a total 23/24 value of £1.565m against an allocation of £757k. The RPbP board delegated responsibility for evaluation and selection to a Health Inequalities steering group, which was formed. Each bid was scored against a set of criteria outlined by NEL ICB to ensure a consistent process across NEL place based partnerships.
	Alongside the scoring of the bids the Steering group discussed the target cohorts, value for money of each bid and the suitability, in relation to the Health Inequalities criteria. This was particularly relevant for bids based around staffing and infrastructure where there were potentially more relevant / appropriate funding options to pursue.
	Based on the evaluation process the steering group are proposing the following bids be funded for 23/24:
